Pupil Premium strategy

At Broad Square Primary our aim is to ensure that all children are able to access every aspect of the school's provision in order to achieve the highest standards of achievement and the greatest possible progress in relation to their individual starting points. Pupil Premium is funding provided to schools which is additional to main school funding. It is allocated according to the number of pupils on roll who have been eligible for free school meals within the past 6 years. In Broad Square this money is used to support pupils' individual needs and to help them overcome their barriers to learning.

Main Barriers to Learning

Some of our children start school well below national expectations as a result of limited experiences from birth, often stemming from vulnerable families. In order to address children's developmental gaps we direct a range of resources, interventions and strategies for both children and parents. Barriers and challenges faced by some of our disadvantaged pupils are many and varied. They often increase in complexity as the children get older e.g.

- Poverty
- Vulnerable parenting – dysfunctional home: mental health, domestic violence, poor basic skills, unemployment, drugs and alcohol.
- Poor nutrition
- Poor language/communication skills
- Immature development socially, emotionally and physically
- Challenging behaviour
- Poor self-esteem/lack of confidence (children and parents) resulting in low expectations and aspirations.
- Limited life experiences and access to everyday opportunities e.g. visiting the park, library etc.
- Limited involvement in school and poor attendance
- Lack of access to technology/sports/clubs etc.
- Low IQ, specific learning/health needs which have not been identified/accepted by families resulting in delayed intervention and support.

The nurture group supports some of our most vulnerable pupils and helps develop confidence, social skills and supports learning.
£112,342	Additional 3 teachers and 1 non-teaching member of staff to deliver the intervention programs and the nurture facility.	Rec - year 6	Analysis of pupil data shows that most pupils who received this intervention made progress comparable to or above their peers.

Year 2 & 6	Key Stage 1 results show that the percentage of PP pupils gaining the expected standard has risen since 2016 and the gap with non PP children has closed in Reading and Maths. At Key Stage 2 there has also been an increase in the percentage of PP pupils reaching the expected standard since 2016 and the gap with Non PP children has closed in all subjects. Progress data shows that on average pupil premium children make better progress than non-pupil premium children nationally in reading, writing and maths.
£15,772	Employment of trainee play therapists to support vulnerable pupils and break down barriers to learning.	Selected Pupils from across school	The play therapists work 1-1 with a number of children to support their learning. Children work through their issues during the play sessions and gain confidence which transfers into the classroom. Teachers and parents note a significant improvement in pupil's ability to concentrate having been through the program.
£12,000	Creation of a fully resourced art studio to provide pupils with a vibrant environment in which to develop their creativity and skills.	Whole school	The art studio has allowed pupils to develop art and craft activities and has enriched the curriculum. Pupils produced a wall hanging to celebrate diversity in the school.
£3,500	Additional reading books to encourage reading for pleasure, especially targeted at reluctant readers and boys.	Whole school	More pupils encouraged to read and a variety of books targeted at boys and reluctant readers. Increase in the number of pupils reaching the expected standard in years 2 and 6.
£12,775	To provide a variety of extra-curricular activities during Friday afternoons, e.g. Dance, sports, drama, sewing, computing, art etc.	Years 1-6	These provide pupils with a range of experiences they wouldn't meet in the regular curriculum. They develop skills, confidence and socialization with pupils other than in their own year groups.
£8,645	Subsidy for trips and visitors.	Whole school	Trips and visitor enhance the curriculum for all pupils. It gives pupils experiences they would not usually have. School will pay full costs for families who are having difficulty.

PLANNED PUPIL PREMIUM EXPENDITURE FOR 2017/2018

In 2017/18 the pupil premium allocation is £215,160

Whilst pupil premium children make expected and above expected progress in line with other pupils there is still a gap between the percentage who reach national standard at the end of each Key Stage compared to their peers. School will continue to use the allocation to break down the barriers to learning which hinder pupils attainment. We will continue to offer all of the intervention and support strategies as detailed in last year's allocation, including an additional teacher to provide further maths & literacy intervention.

We understand that children's and adults well-being is vitally important and has a bearing on how well pupils learn. This year we will be spending a proportion of the funding to support mental health and well-being. This includes:

- Continuing and developing the role of the play therapists
- Introducing yoga to pupils and adults
- Providing 'Relax Kids' training so that this can be delivered to the children
- Some children will have an opportunity to try 'Drum Therapy'
- Running baby massage sessions in school
- We will be running the 'It's Your Child's Life' course for reception parents
- We will run the 'Incredible Years' training again for parents
- Introduce 2 courses to help the parents of reception children learn about the EYFS curriculum and learn practical ways to support their children
- Start an after school homework club to help children who find it difficult to do this at home

Additionally some of the allocation will provide additional class books so that children have access to quality texts for their guided reading.

Pupil premium is used to employ our attendance officer, who works along-side the school's learning mentor to support families whose children are PA (persistent absentee of below 90% attendance).

Pupil premium will continue to fully or partially subsidise the cost of school trips and visits so that all children can take part, and to provide resources to deliver a broad and stimulating curriculum.

Early Years pupil premium allocation is £2,213

This year the money will be spend on resources to support learning. It will be used to subsidise school trips to broaden pupil's experiences of the world around them. It will also support staff training to keep practitioners fully up to date with developments in Early Years education.
